

KLB EXTENDS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH MERU COUNTY

Kenya Literature Bureau's partnership with the Meru County has been extended with the current Government sanctioning purchase of learning and teaching materials worth over Sh10 million. The books were flagged off by the Governor H.E Kawira Mwangaza, to schools, on 18th April at the County Offices in Meru Town. These will be distributed to schools within Meru County. The consignment will benefit over 60,000 Early Year learners within the county's jurisdiction and were delivered by the General

Manager-Commercial Services Division, Mr. Evans Nyachieng'a.

The endeavour has been necessitated by the need to ensure that learners get access to reading materials which in turn will improve literacy levels, especially among the Early Years. The Bureau will also facilitate a Trainer of Trainers workshop for ECDE teachers on how to be better facilitators of tutoring as well as understanding the new Competency Based Curriculum.

The newly acquired Manugraph Citiline Express web printing machine has been fully installed and is now being tested for use.
